RIDE FOR OPEN SPACE 2024

The 2nd Annual Ride for Open Space was held on July 16th, 2024 staging from our beautiful Cabbage Hill Preserve in Woodstock (acquired in 2021 thanks to an anonymous donor).

Approximately 50 riders participated this year and were treated to a great trail ride through our Nightingale Forest property and some private lands. Riders returned to a delicious lunch provided by the Rolling Tomato brick oven pizza, followed by Ben & Jerry's ice cream.



We've established a supportive fan base and plan to grow the numbers of riders and sponsors each year. Cabbage Hill is a terrific place to host a ride from with plenty of horse trailer parking and level ground.

Our ride committee consists of Sue Jackson, Penny Gladstone-Kaiser, Nina Kneeland, and myself. We added sponsors this year

THOMPSON: BLACKMORE FOREST

After years of work by the board, we are pleased to announce to acquisition of a 275-acre wooded parcel from the Scouting America, Narragansett Council. The land is on the CT/RI border and abuts the Buck Hill Scout Reservation in Burrillville, RI. To the west it connects with our LeClair preserve and Quaddick State Park.

“We’ve been working for several years to protect this property,” explained Mike St. Lawrence, President of the Wyndham Land Trust. “We identified it as a key link in the wildlife corridor between Quaddick State Park/State Forest owned by Connecticut and state-owned parks and forests in both Rhode Island and Massachusetts. This represents a very large forest block—almost 15,000 acres—that provides critical wildlife habitat in Southern New England.”

“In addition, the new preserve, which we are calling Blackmore Forest, will protect extensive wetlands, including brooks that feed into Quaddick Pond, the Five Mile River, and ultimately the Thames River and Long Island Sound. It’s a historic site with partial remnants of Thompson’s Town Farm, formerly an alms house for the poor and destitute in town.”

The Land Trust is working with the Thompson Trails Committee to map and blaze the existing network of trails on the property. Stay tuned!



BERRY

The Berry family recently donated three parcels of woodland totaling 15 acres to the Land Trust. The properties sit along Mashentuck Road in Killingly, close to the home where Louise and Richard Berry raised their five children. Louise Berry was well regarded in the Quiet Corner and touched many lives. She was best known as the school Superintendent for the Town of Brooklyn and, at the time of her retirement in 2016, was the longest serving school Superintendent in Connecticut history. She also served in the 1970s as State Senator for the 29th district. Richard was best known as an executive of Rogers Corporation, where he worked for more than 40 years.

FUNDRAISING DRIVE FOR HILLANDALE WOODS

The fundraising campaign to protect Hillandale Woods has been very successful thanks to generous donations from many of you, coupled with the \$50,000 matching funds from Keith and Elaine Knowlton. We recently received a \$100,000 grant from the Bafflin Foundation, and now have over \$400,000 of the \$635,000 that we need to raise. We have until March 2025 to close the deal, and are hoping that end-of-the-year charitable donations from members and supporters will help us get closer to the target.

WALKTOBER

Two preserves that have grown recently were featured during The Last Green Valley's Walktober program.

As a long time TLGV partner, WLT participates in Walktober to offer a few steps in a new place every year. Different preserves in different towns, Nightingale Forest in Pomfret and Tamler Preserve in Thompson had similarities that are reflected throughout Northeast CT. History and stories live in the forests.

Andy Rzeznikiewicz took a group into the Nightingale Forest for a unique opportunity to explore this preserve, accessible



only on an organized walk like this. A gorgeous day had hikers experiencing old foundations, a mill site and grave yard in the middle of the forest.

Jeff Stefanik had an equally enthusiastic group at the Tamler Preserve on another bright but a bit more chilly morning, as the leaves crunched under foot in the remote woods of the "Widow Hannah Barrett Road". Views included old foundations in these woods as well.

What Makes a Good Neighbor to the Preserve?

Living near a preserve offers unique access to the beauty and peace of nature. Here are a few ways we can work together to protect this space for generations to come:

• Respect Boundaries

Refrain from expanding personal property into preserve areas.

Maintaining clear boundaries helps protect native plants and wildlife from unintended disturbances.

• Leave No Trace

Avoid leaving trash or pet waste in or near the preserve. Bring along waste bags, and if you see any litter, consider helping out by taking it with you when you leave.

• Be the "Eyes and Ears" of the Preserve

If you notice anything unusual or concerning—such as invasive species, trail damage, or unauthorized activity—please reach out to the land trust. Your vigilance helps us protect and preserve this area for everyone.

• Spread the Word

Encourage friends and neighbors to join the land trust. More members mean more support, which directly impacts the preserve's future. Together, we can build a stronger, more connected community dedicated to conservation.

• Get Involved!

Volunteer with the land trust, attend (or lead!) a local nature walk. Being involved helps deepen the connection to this shared resource.
